





With its unique orchestra, Mécanique Vivante creates unforgettable installations, itinerant parades and aquatic shows..

# The shows

#### Recitals

The orchestra is hoisted to the top of masts, or suspended from handmade arches around the public. Day-time or night-time, several performances per day. Possibility of installing an alfresco auditorium (200 seats in Mécanique Vivante's reclining chairs).

#### **Street Harmonics**

The orchestra parades through town mounted on its locomotives.

Daytime or night-time, a 60 to 90 minute parade (depending on the site). The parade can end in a live show with the company's associated artists and creative lighting, should the project call for it.





#### Nénuphar

Installation of the orchestra on 'Nénuphar' - small, navigable floating stages, designed for shallow waters.



Day-time or night-time, floating recitals, waterborne parades or a full show with the company's associated artists and creative lighting if required.







# Nénuphar

Mécanique Vivante's Nénuphar stages and illuminates the river and its banks in a visual, musical odyssey.

Nénuphar can be a fixed, floating installation of the Siren Orchestra with a live performance from the Sirenist, an aquatic parade, or a full floating show with the company's associated artists.

For nocturnal shows, the company collaborates with Pierre Wendels for lighting and Alain Micquiaux and his waterborne poppy fields. The company can collaborate with local choristers drifting on small, Mécanique Vivante made islands, if appropriate and if the budget allows.

The show is modular, flexible, stationary or mobile, and can be daytime or night-time.

# **Associated Artists**

## The Bellringer's Arch

Statuesque and graceful, the bell-ringer sets the rhythm, awakening the audience and hailing the sirens into the public arena.

### The Divas & their giant horns

Posed on the riverbank amongst the public, two singers lure the Sirens to come join them. There follows a mechanical ballet where the songstresses and their horns spin, creating Doppler effect & sending waves of song across the public.

## The Musical Metronome

Like the pendulum of a metronome six metres in the air, a foghorn adorned with an umbrella sways from side to side, tempting a guitarist out into the open. The foghorn sways drunkenly until the guitarist plays; and then ends the sequence on a majestic, haunting note.

#### **Orchestral Timpani**

In a marked departure from their usual position hidden away at the back of the orchestra, a set of orchestral tympani takes centre stage. Surrounded by the Siren Orchestra the percussionist plays timpani, temple block (1), crotales (2) and a set of gongs.

#### The Sirenist & his Sirénium (3)

The Sirenist improvises and creates ambiance and is joined by the musicians to perform the final number.



- (1) An eastern Asian instrument with a limited range. Mécanique Vivante has developed a 2 octave chromatic Temple block.
- (2) Ancient percussion of Greek origin, made in bronze at Mécanique Vivante. The sound is close to that of bells but the Crotales have a sustain all of their own.
- (3) A digital instrument of mechanical fabrication which allows live improvisation and interpretation of one or more of the sirens.

Constantly looking to create the inimitable, Franz Clochard founded Mécanique Vivante in 1989 to synthesise his two great passions: music and mechanics. Over the years he has created a hybrid, artistic universe with humour and a certain knack of transmuting everyday objects to new, unfamiliar purposes.
